PBL Academy working groups

Working group on PBL and progression

The working group has identified three key tasks relevant to PBL and progression:

- Identification of examples where progression associated to PBL is visible throughout entire curricula
- Development of a manual which may be used to put PBL and progression into curricula
- Writing a brief concept paper outlining what we may understand by progression in relation to problem-based curricula.

The group continues its work during autumn of 2015 and will present results and considerations at a final seminar.

Working group on intercultural issues and PBL

There was a lively and nuanced debate on the topic and many problems and possible solutions were identified. In December the group will host an afternoon seminar for all colleagues (date will be announced later).
